





Staff News:

Other:

We're often asked why computers are available in the children's room, and we're always glad to explain. These questions give us the opportunity to talk about one of the library's core values: access. In today's world, access in the public library means more than just books—it includes technology and digital resources as well.

We recognize that not every family wants or needs their child to use a computer at the library. Some may prefer to avoid screen time during visits, while others may not agree with having computers in a children's space at all. We respect those views, and ultimately, it's each parent or caregiver's choice whether their child uses the computers.

At the same time, we know that many families rely on the library to provide access to technology they may not have at home. Even families with home internet sometimes choose to limit digital use to the library, where they know their children can safely explore educational games, age-appropriate databases, eBooks, audiobooks, and other learning tools. These experiences help children develop essential skills in technology use, digital literacy, and responsible online behavior.

Our trained staff are always available to guide children and caregivers in making safe, informed, and positive use of these resources. We see technology as a vital part of a well-rounded library experience—one that complements our books, programs, and spaces, and helps support learning and growth for all children.

Finally, some visitors have asked if the computers could be moved to a less prominent spot. Unfortunately, they must remain where they are because the current location is the only place in the room with access to dataports—connections that allow the computers to access the internet.

We hope this explanation helps clarify why the library provides computers in the children's room. Thank you for your understanding and for supporting our commitment to serving the diverse needs of our community.
